

Keep your eye on Pinkeye

Cattle Pinkeye: What You Need To Know Right Now

When infectious bovine keratoconjunctivitis (IBK), also known as pinkeye, is introduced into an unvaccinated herd, it can have devastating effects on pregnancy, calving and weaning rates and weights.



Poor herd health can lead to decreased market value.



*Calves infected with pinkeye can be **30-40** lbs lighter at weaning than healthy calves.



Vaccinations are an integral tool for preventing disease and for maintaining herd health.



For vaccinations to increase market value and productivity for beef cattle, they need to be administered according to label directions.



Producers should work with their veterinarians to decide on an optimum vaccination strategy for their herd.

"Weight losses, due to pinkeye, have been measured and quantitated in beef cattle. Losses in dairy cattle production are another aspect of the long-term effects of pinkeye."
